

Community Engagement and Safety Initiatives Report, September 2025

This is a summary of activities for Community Resource Officer Dramane Taylor

1. Pledge to Protect Pep Rally (Sept 19th)

I along with Ofc. Krohme, Chief Stevens participated in the "Pledge to Protect" pep rally, an event focused on promoting fundraising, school safety, respect, and responsibility among students. Officers engaged with students to reinforce the importance of positive choices and building safe school environments.

2. Career Fairs – Western Illinois University (Sept. 23rd) & Illinois Central College (Oct 1st)

I along with Department representatives attended career fairs at Western Illinois University and Illinois Central College to promote careers in law enforcement and community service. Officers met with students, discussed public safety careers, and shared internship and recruitment opportunities.

3. Active Intruder Training – Washington Library Staff (Sept 26)

An active intruder preparedness training session was conducted for the Washington District Library staff. The training focused on situational awareness, response options under the "Run, Hide, Fight" model, and effective communication with first responders during critical incidents.

4. Bullying Seminar – Crossroads Church (Sept. 27th)

A community seminar on bullying prevention was hosted at Crossroads Church. The program addressed identifying bullying behaviors, distinguishing between conflicts and bullying, and provided guidance for students, parents, and educators on reporting and intervention strategies.

5. Career Spark Event (October 1st-2nd)

The Washington Police Department participated in the Career Spark event, engaging middle and high school students with interactive safety displays and discussions on public safety career paths, teamwork, and leadership.

6. Homecoming Responsibilities in absence of Ofc. Westbrook (Oct. 3rd-4th)

6. School Lockdown Drills (Sept 19-Oct. 8th)

Lockdown and active intruder drills were conducted at:

- Lincoln Grade School
- Washington Middle School

- Washington Community High School
- Beverly Manor School
- Central Intermediate and Central Primary Schools

These drills were coordinated with school administrators and staff to ensure preparedness, communication efficiency, and student safety procedures were well understood.

7. Safety Presentation – "Beyond the Bell: Staying Safe In and Out of School" (Oct.6th) In partnership with **Central Intermediate School**, officers delivered a presentation emphasizing personal safety, online awareness, and safe decision-making for students both during and after school hours. I briefly covered safety tips about E-Bicycles and E-Scooters. The initiative continues to strengthen the partnership between the Washington Police Department and local educational institutions.
