WASHINGTON EMBRACES NEW WATER UTILITY TECHNOLOGY

The City of Washington will be replacing approximately 6,000 of its 7,400 water meters throughout the city, beginning in late Spring. Existing water meters utilize moving internal components to measure the consumption of water which wear out over time, resulting in reduced accuracy. The new meters feature no moving parts and facilitate an automated meter reading process through the use of radio technology that will provide greater efficiency in meter reading, more timely leak detection, and the ability to bill monthly rather than quarterly as requested by many residents. Over 1,000 meters have already been replaced during the rebuild the last two years and approximately 500 will not be replaced in this phase because of the age of the meter; however in all cases radio technology will be installed.

What is the process for the replacement? Do I have to be home?

The City has contracted with HD Supply for the project and the actual installations will be done by their subcontractor – United Meters, Inc. (UMI). All residents who are scheduled to receive the new meters will be sent a letter from the City requesting that they call United Meters toll free to set up an appointment within a 2 hour window. Under normal conditions, the meter replacement will take approximately 30 minutes. We encourage everyone receiving a letter to respond promptly so the project may proceed in a timely, orderly and efficient manner. Please note that “radio only” installations will not require an appointment or inside access.

Will UMI employees be going door-to-door unsolicited?

If UMI is in your neighborhood and hasn't received a call for an appointment, they may request an opportunity to replace your meter while in the area. All installers have been thoroughly background checked by our Police Department, will have appropriate photo identification on them at all times, and will be driving company marked vehicles.

How is this project being funded?

Various funding methods have been investigated and presented to the City Council and a technology fee that will be included on the monthly bill is currently being proposed. This fee is estimated to be between \$3.85 and \$5.50 per month depending on the number of meters installed. The City Council will set the fee this spring.

How will the City transition from quarterly to monthly billing?

All residents will receive a quarterly bill in **May for January through March 2016 usage** and in **July for April through June usage**. In **September, July and August** usage will be billed and **October will be the first monthly bill** that is reflective of one month's usage from **September**. The technology fee will not be applied until monthly billing is fully implemented in October 2016 as currently projected.

Won't this make our water rates higher than surrounding communities?

No. Actually a typical City of Washington water bill at 4,500 gallons per month is only \$18.54, or 50% of the local regional average of \$37.31 per month. Furthermore, even though sewer rates may be higher than surrounding communities, the combined water and sewer average bill of \$57.15 compares favorably to the regional average of \$66.88. The proposed technology fee will still keep Washington comparable to this combined water and sewer regional average.

DEVELOPMENT HAPPENINGS...

The building staff issued 90 new residential building permits in 2015 with an estimated construction value of nearly \$17.2 million. Of the residential permits issued, 38 were for single-family dwellings and 52 were for multi-family dwellings. Staff issued ten commercial/industrial permits for a construction value of \$7.16 million. Both the residential and commercial/industrial permits have increased over the past year.



The rebuilding of the city from the November 17, 2013, tornado has continued to progress at a quick rate. A total of 481 residential rebuild permits have been issued since the tornado. Additionally, another 92 tornado-related permits were issued in 2015 comprising of new roofs, new garages, and major house repairs with a total of 894 over the last two-plus years. There are only 24 single-family and duplex lots and two multi-family lots that have not commenced rebuilding.

Additionally, the City was recently approved for two economic development tools. A new Enterprise Zone became effective on January 1, replacing the previous zone that had been active since 1986. The Enterprise Zone provides benefits for commercial and industrial properties that undertake a building improvement or new construction project that requires a building permit. Benefits include a five-year property tax abatement upon completion of the project, a sales tax waiver on all materials permanently incorporated into the real estate, a 50% utility connection fee waiver, and a 50% building permit fee waiver.

Finally, the City received funding from the US Department of Agriculture (USDA) and leverage assistance from some city banks to help establish a Revolving Loan Fund that can be used by any businesses east of Ernest Street per the USDA regulations. The program is intended to provide gap funding for those businesses looking to retain or create jobs. Eligible activities include inventory and working capital, machinery and equipment purchases, and small business development. This funding offers competitive interest rates to supplement traditional bank financing. Please check out either of these programs on the City's website: www.ci.washington.il.us.

WASHINGTON POLICE DEPARTMENT NEWS. . .

Hopefully we will not have to use this again this winter, but there seems to be some confusion with regards to our policy on parking bans during snowfalls. First, the ordinance allows for us to issue a parking ban when the conditions are right for the possible accumulation of snow or ice over 2-inches. The ban automatically goes into effect once the 2-inch level is reached. So we generally attempt to put the ban into effect when a prediction is made where we expect to reach that level. The part that seems to confuse some people is that there is a built-in timetable for individuals to remove their vehicles from the street, after the ban goes into effect. This is done so that people who may be at work have an opportunity to remove their vehicle before we start enforcement. This "lapse" in time is incorrectly viewed by some as "the police don't enforce this," which is not correct. Our primary concern is to gain compliance of the general public to move their vehicles off the street so that the City plows can clear the roadways. Often times, the plows make their first pass down the middle of the street, to provide a drivable lane, but then make a return pass, in an attempt to clear the roadway from "curb to curb." Lastly, once the snow parking ban is placed into effect, it will automatically last 48-hours, unless it is cancelled sooner. With winter nearly two-thirds over, I hope that we don't have to worry about this again, but we do live in central Illinois and one never knows what the weather will do!
